Cruise lines unite for safety

Norwegian Cruise Line Holdings (NCLH) and Royal Caribbean Cruises have announced their collaboration in onboard health, forming a joint Healthy Sail Panel.

The initiative will work on the development of recommendations for cruise lines to advance their public health response to coronavirus.

Co-Chaired by former Commissioner of the United States' Food and Drug Administration Dr Scott Gottlieb, the panel also features former Secretary of Health & Human Services and former Governor of Utah Mike Leavitt.

Other members include

NCLH Executive Vice President Vessel Operations Robin Lindsay and Royal Caribbean Cruises Senior Vice President Global Marine Operations Captain Patrik Dahlgren, as well as seven other eminent physicians and scientists.

The panel has been tasked with delivering its initial recommendations by the end of next month, with the work of the group to be "open source", and able to be freely adopted by any company or industry that would benefit from its scientific and medical insights.

NCLH Chief Executive Officer Frank Del Rio and Royal Caribbean Group Chief Executive Officer & Chairman Richard Fain said

the panel was created to ensure the plans they submit to the United States' Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will apply the best available public health and insights.

Carnival Corporation has also announced its own health initiative, a joint "virtual scientific summit" conducted in partnership with the World Travel & Tourism Council.

Scheduled to take place later this month, the three-hour public summit will share the latest scientific knowledge and evidence-based best practices related to prevention, detection, treatment, and mitigation of coronavirus.

Australia is famous for our world-class vineyards and unique wines. The Hunter Valley of New South Wales, Barossa Valley in South Australia, Yarra Valley in Victoria and Margaret River in Western Australia have all become tourist hot spots for their bevy of vineyards and well established winery tours.

For visitors and locals alike, visiting a vineyard has become a must on any itinerary, adding significantly to our economy. Wine tourism showcases not only the fine vintages, but also the spectacular locations in which their wines are made. Here are some other

beautiful regions offering delicious wines and memorable experiences.

Orange, New South Wales

This quaint, regional town in the heart of country NSW is a rising star in the Australian food and wine industry. Enjoying a cooler climate provided by the higher altitude, Orange boasts some fine vineyards offering unique flavours.

CARGO ROAD WINES

Winemaker James Sweetapple has employed holistic farming methods to produce his 'cool climate wines with altitude'. Some of these use Barbera and Zinfandel grapes, unique variants used by only a few vineyards. Indulge your taste buds as you sit on the sun drenched balcony sipping on their divine Primitivo Love Rosé.

ORANGE MOUNTAIN WINES

Terry Dolle is an award winning winemaker

and well known for his unique Orange Mountain Ice Viognier. Family run and operated, this inviting cellar door will give you a treat as you sample their selection of ice wines; the only vineyard in the region to produce them.

Mt Tamborine, Queensland

Situated in the stunning hinterland of Queensland, Mt Tamborine is an enchanting

getaway within an hour of both Brisbane and the Gold Coast. To many visitors' great surprise, this mountainous region is home to some fine varieties of wine. Book a weekend, enjoy the stunning nature walks, and plan ample time for tastings.

MOUNT TAMBORINE VINEYARD & WINERY

Stroll down the Gallery Walk, the artistic main street of Mount Tamborine and you'll come across this quaint cellar door. Always bustling with locals and visitors, the friendly staff will be happy to offer you a tasting of some of the locally grown vintages. Don't miss the adjoining shop full of handmade treasures and the charming gardens that surround it.

WITCHES FALLS WINERY

Enjoy a leisurely afternoon at Witches Falls. Start with a short bush walk at the nearby trail and enjoy panoramic views of the hinterland. Then head to the vineyards to sample some of the bold and distinctive wines at the cellar door, paired with locally made Jambreen cheeses, enjoyed best as a picnic in the lovely gardens.

Hobart, Tasmania

Hobart offers the picturesque, puzzle-shaped harbour viewed best from the panoramic lookouts at Mt Wellington and Mt Nelson. Travel to the picturesque town of Hahndorf, just an hour outside of Adelaide and enjoy a step back in time in Australia's oldest surviving German settlement. Stay in charming bed and breakfasts and enjoy meandering down the tree lined streets, pottering in the stone-clad shops and restaurants. Book a wine tour or enjoy a

Driving down a long dirt track with vines rising high either side, be met by a wooden chalet looming over a still lake. Once inside, savour sampling their decadent Rosé, made from Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon. K1 by Geoff Hardy is exquisite, a vineyard that offers more than just wines; it's the perfect backdrop for your weekend escape.

The Great Ocean Road, VIC

Australia's answer to California's State Route 1, Victoria's Great Ocean Road is synonymous with Australian road trips. Of course, there is the emblematic attraction of the Twelve Apostles (of which seven still remain) but also awaiting you on this classic voyage is a range of coastal scenery, along with waterfalls and rainforests. Plus, spot animals such as koalas, echidnas and wallabies along the way; how Australian can a road trip get?

The Coral Coast, WA

This road trip unites the desert and the sea on a trip from Perth to Ningaloo Reef, with the landscape changing from green farmland to red dirt. Meander along Australia's west coast, stopping to hike the dramatic gorges of Kalbarri National Park, snorkel in Ningaloo Reef, or even swim with whale sharks, the world's largest fish. Keep your eyes peeled for classic Australian landmarks such as the Pinnacles and One Mile Jetty along the way.

When people discover the extent of my cruise travels around the world, the first question they always ask is “which is your favourite?” How do you answer that? Not only is it so hard to whittle down, I believe every destination offers something unique and attractive in its own way, from rural to urban experiences, to social encounters, cultural engagement, to landscapes that abound in diversity.




1. Norwegian Coast

Imagine slowly gliding through twisting, narrow passages onboard your cruise ship while viewing quaint communities nestled beneath majestic landscapes ...this itinerary rates as my number one cruise destination as it's the perfect combination of cruise and land experience. Each town and city is unique, while the cruising is serene. Crown the itinerary at the remote port of Longyearbyen on the island of Svalbard and you have spent a week or two gaining an appreciation of the best of nature's beauty on this planet.

2. Yangon, Myanmar

Whether I've cruised into the port or taken a river cruise up the Irrawaddy, this land is special to me. It's raw, untouched; her innocence welcomes you with open arms. The people are wonderfully friendly, the monks shuffle through markets, tourists snap in amazement at the Shwedagon Pagoda, and the cities of Bagan and Mandalay (which you can visit during a river cruise) lay quietly in the heartland of spiritual Burma. If you ever wanted to visit a location before commercialism strikes, here is your spot.



3. Reykjavik, Iceland

You may still not be able to spell it after your visit, but you will remember it forever as it is one of the most unique geological landscapes on this planet. Being so isolated is why it's probably one of the most underestimated destinations, though the city is rich with cosmopolitan living and the discoveries that start on the Golden Route has led me to some of the best adventures that I've ever taken part in.

4. Antarctica

If I told you I am going to take you to a cold, windy, remote part of the world where the only civilisation are clusters of research stations, it probably wouldn't rank as your must do's. You'd miss out! The waters along the coast and islands of ice are a wildlife playground, while mountains that soar towards the midnight sun on the Peninsula are spellbinding. I'm not a fan of the cold, but every visit, every day, I spent hours outside just gazing at the world, feeling special – like I was the only one experiencing it. Note: The research stations are actually pretty cool to visit.

5. New England, North America

Every year I looked forward to our New England season and desperately wanted to include it into my top 10. Upon wondering how I can explain its appeal (no 'one' thing is a stand out), it dawned on me that it was the combination of ports here that compose a charm. Starting from New York and working your way up the East Coast, a mix of big metropolises (New York, Boston, Quebec, Montreal) are blended with small towns (Newport, Bar Harbour, Halifax) which when combined with the odd day at sea, makes it a diverse, fresh cruise. Highlights of course include the foliage change in the fall, though old fishing ports and villages give it a boutique feeling amongst world-class cities. The sailing along St. Lawrence River is also a highlight as you approach beautiful Quebec and further Montreal.



Travel the world with mince & meatballs



Bobotie

Serves 4-6

This recipe is from South African Tourism and Adventure World. Bobotie is a quintessential South African dish. This is the last week of our travelling the world with mince and meatballs feature. From next week, we'll be bringing you cocktail recipes, because at the moment we really need a drink!

Ingredients

2 thick slices bread, crusts removed
 ½ cup milk
 50g unsalted butter
 2 large onions, finely chopped
 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
 1 tbsp chopped ginger
 2 tbsp mild curry powder
 2 tbsp tomato paste
 2 tbsp fruit chutney, plus extra to serve
 3 bay leaves
 2 tbsp vinegar
 1kg beef mince
 1/3 cup sultanas
 1/3 cup slivered almonds, toasted and chopped
 1 cup water

EGG TOPPING

2 eggs
 1 cup full cream milk
 1/4 tsp ground turmeric

TOMATO SALSA

2 tomatoes, chopped
 1 small brown or white onion, chopped
 2 tbsp malt vinegar
 Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

Preheat oven to 180°C. Soak breadcrumbs in milk and set aside. Meanwhile, melt butter in a large, deep ovenproof frypan over medium heat (a skillet is great for this, but if you don't have an ovenproof pan just cook the mixture in a regular pan, transfer the mince to a casserole dish and then pour over the egg mixture to bake). Add onion to the pan and then cook, stirring, for 3-4 minutes until soft, seasoning with salt and pepper. Add the garlic and ginger, then cook for a further 1 minute until fragrant then add the curry powder and stir through. Add bay leaves, tomato paste, chutney and vinegar and cook for 2-3 minutes to caramelise the mixture slightly. Add the mince and cook, breaking up lumps with a wooden spoon, for 5-6 minutes until browned. Stir in the soaked bread and milk, breaking it up to combine then add the sultanas and almonds. Add 1 cup water, season, reduce the heat to medium low and cook for 10 minutes until reduced.

For the topping, beat the egg, turmeric and milk in a bowl or jug and season with salt. Remove the beef mixture from the heat then press down on the mixture to create a flat surface. Carefully pour over egg mixture. Scatter over extra bay leaves and bake for 35-40 minutes or until the topping is golden.

Meanwhile combine all the ingredients for the tomato salsa in a bowl and set aside.

Remove bobotie from the oven and serve immediately with the salsa and extra chutney.


