# For foodies

## A world of creepy crawly delicacies

In the western world, most of us would sooner spray an insect with Mortein than shove a fried creepy crawly down our throats, but there are a host of countries around the world that believe we are letting the best snacks in life pass us by.

Those from the Mexican state of Oaxaca for example love nothing more than chomping on miniature grasshoppers stuffed inside corn tortillas. The critters are often dusted in lime, chilli or garlic before being cooked, with the taste described as either smoky, herby or malty.

In China, virtually every insect and arachnid are available to sample in one way or another, but the locals swear by the scorpion skewers. One of the popular ways of cooking these guys up is to marinate them in white wine sauce and fry them up on a high heat. As you can imagine from the look, the texture is quite crunchy and the taste profile

is described by most as slightly fishy. Other popular cooking methods include roasting and grilling.

In Cambodia, the tarantula often makes its ways on to the plates of locals. Referred to by Cambodians as “a-ping”, the spiders, as pictured below, are tossed with a host of herbs and spices before being fried with garlic, salt or sugar. We recommend starting with a leg to see if you enjoy the taste first, then if you’re brave enough, tackle the juicy abdomen.



# In the News

## Seabourn to Australia in 2022-2023

Seabourn Cruise Line has announced its 2022-2023 season will include Australia, with *Seabourn Odyssey* to arrive for the peak whale-watching season.

From Dec 2022 to Mar 2023, Seabourn will sail five 16-day voyages between Sydney and Auckland, which will also take in New Zealand’s Fiordland National Park, Kaikoura, and more.

Extra-keen travellers will

have the option of keeping the party going with a pre- or post-cruise Seabourn Journey, which will explore The Rocks and the Opera House in Sydney.

Also offered will be a flight to Alice Springs to tour Kata Tjuta, a cruise on the Daintree River and more.

## Australians keen to shred Kiwi slopes

Booking.com has revealed Australian travellers are looking to New Zealand and its powdery slopes, with

demand sloping considerably from green to double black.

Top Australian search increases for destinations in New Zealand include Queenstown, which Aussies are looking up at approximately eight times more than the prior month, and Auckland & Christchurch, are being searched for at rates around seven times the month prior.

Also hot are the New Zealand capital Wellington and popular ski resort town Wanaka, with the research also uncovering two-thirds of Australians feel more hopeful about travelling this year.

# Travel never dies

James Bond is the longest continually running film series of all time, with the first of the 24 movies, *Dr. No*, debuting in 1962. Since then, Bond has blazed a trail of cultural impact across the world that has left almost nowhere untreaded by his famous Aston Martin, discovers Myles Stedman.

Phang Nga Bay on Thailand's coast has placed host to a number of James Bond films including *The Man with the Golden Gun* and *Tomorrow Never Dies*.

In his almost 60 years on the British Secret Intelligence Service, Bond has been to almost every continent on Earth, with the exception of Antarctica, and our own – Oceania.

The closest 007 has come to the land Down Under is Thailand, which contains arguably

the most famous Bond locale there is. Khao Phing Kan, an island in Phang Nga Bay, that was before the 1970s, most famous for its 20-metre-tall islet, Ko Tu Pu, located about 40 metres off its coast. That all changed in 1974, when Bond travelled to the Land of

Smiles in *The Man with the Golden Gun*, in his pursuit of the fictional technology, the Solex Agitator, which sees him land on what is now popularly known as James Bond Island. Almost 50 years later and travellers are still heading to Khao Phing Kan to take photos

posing with an imaginary pistol, in homage to Roger Moore's Bond.

A later instalment, 1997's *Tomorrow Never Dies*, paid its respects to the earlier film itself, with Pierce Brosnan's 007 heading back to Phang Nga Bay as he attempts to

stop power-mad media proprietor Elliot Carver, and resulting in fans both young and old thinking of Thailand, and saying "Bond... James Bond".

Bond's creator, Brit Ian Fleming, wrote the character during the backdrop of Cold War-era Europe, with the Soviet Union serving as the antagonist in many of the films. As a result, many of the James Bond movies feature adventures throughout Europe, most of which are initiated from London's SIS Building. Built in 1994, MI6's headquarters is star of many establishing shots throughout the Brosnan and Daniel Craig Bonds, but is hardly much of a tourist attraction in and of itself. Much more popular is the Czech Republic's Grandhotel Pupp, which serves as the exterior of 2006's

*Casino Royale*. Although the film's casino is based in Montenegro, and inspired by that which is located in Monaco, the 228-room Czech luxury hotel, which fittingly hosts the annual Karlovy Vary International Film Festival, is now the site of many wealthier Bond fans' affections, who fawn over the thought of getting ready for their own high-stakes poker game at the extravagant establishment – although unless you're a serious gamer, there's probably no chance of playing a hand of Texas hold'em at the table featured in the film.

If you're after the other kind of European James Bond experience, head to the summit of Schilthorn, Switzerland, where several scenes from *On Her Majesty's Secret Service* were filmed – the only Bond movie starring

Australian George Lazenby in the lead role. Don't forget to stop off for lunch at Piz Gloria revolving restaurant, located almost 3,000 metres above sea level. Keen-eyed Bond fans will recognise the eatery's name from the mountaintop hideout of the film's villain, Ernst Stavro Blofeld. The lower floor of the restaurant houses an exhibition, Bond World, and the 007 Walk of Fame, the latter of which was opened by Lazenby and members of the film crew.

When it comes to iconic Bond locations, most fans of the films will recognise the Jamaican town of Ocho Rios, located on the country's north coast, for playing home to large parts of *Dr. No*. Couples Sans Souci All Inclusive resort was used as the exterior of the Blue Mountain cottage, home to the film's

villain Miss Taro, while the famous Dunn's River Falls also featured in the film.

A decade later, Ocho Rios was also used in *Live and Let Die*. However, true Bond cognoscenti will be most keen to visit Goldeneye estate, home to Fleming from 1946 until his death. Overlooking Oracabessa Bay, and its own private beach, the manor's three-bedroom structure was constructed from Fleming's own sketches. The property now operates as a luxury resort, consisting of Fleming's main house and several subsequent cottages. GoldenEye is also adjacent to James Bond Beach, which features a water sports centre, a restaurant, and a bar called Moonraker – a perfect place to raise a glass to your James Bond fandom and take in a view to kill.

# Four things

Weird, wacky, and wonderful. Here are four lesser known museums to visit next.



## The Neon Museum

It may be most famous as a chemical element, with the atomic number 10, but apparently, neon is also a highly sought after collectible. The Neon Museum, fittingly located in Las Vegas, features signs from old casinos and other businesses displayed outdoors across more than 10,000m<sup>2</sup>. The Museum's visitor centre itself features a restored lobby shell from the defunct La Concha Motel. Each of the signs in the collection is fully restored, and holds a story about who created, it and why it is important.

## Sulabh International Museum of Toilets

It is perhaps a surprise Delhi is home to the Sulabh International Museum of Toilets. Dedicated to the global history of sanitation and bathrooms, it was established in 1992 by sociologist and social entrepreneur Bindeshwar Pathak, precisely in order to address the problems of the sanitation sector in India. The Museum has exhibits from 50 countries, and a range of artefacts spanning from 3,000 BC through to the end of the 20th century.



## Meguro Parasitological Museum

In case you were hoping it didn't, unfortunately, Tokyo's Meguro Parasitological Museum hosts a collection of exactly what you'd imagine – parasites. The two-story exhibition space provides an overview of the diversity of parasites in the natural world, and their life cycles, with the second having a particular focus on parasites in humans and their effects. On display are 300 preserved specimens, including an 8.8-metre-long broad tapeworm. The research library contains a separate collection of 60,000 parasite specimens, as well as 50,000 papers and 5,000 books on parasitology. For the record, this is all more than we needed to know.

## Beaulieu's National Motor Museum

The National Motor Museum, located in Beaulieu, England, is not just famous for its 250 vehicles manufactured since the late 19th century – the museum also has a collection of motoring books, journals, photographs, films and automobilia. Of particular note is the On Screen Cars exhibit, which features a display of TV and film cars, including Del Boy's Reliant Regal as featured in the BBC sitcom *Only Fools and Horses*, Mr. Bean's lime green Mini, *Doctor Who's* Bessie, and an entire James Bond vehicles exhibition.

## CityWalk, Reykjavik, Iceland


## Icon under a microscope
